

Managing Health & Illness policy



Policy Statement

Early Years Day Nursery Uxbridge is committed to promoting the health, wellbeing and safety of all children in our care. We recognise that effective management of illness and infection is essential to reduce the risk of spread, protect vulnerable children and staff and maintain a safe and hygienic environment.

The nursery promotes good health practices, including oral health and follows current guidance from the National Health Service and the UK Health Security Agency.

We ensure that all staff understand their responsibilities in identifying signs of illness, responding appropriately, and taking necessary action to safeguard the health of children and others within the setting.

This policy is implemented in line with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) statutory framework.

The nursery promotes a proactive approach to health and illness, ensuring early identification, clear communication with families, and consistent application of procedures.

Procedure

- If a child appears unwell during the nursery day, staff will assess the situation promptly and take appropriate steps to support the child and minimise the risk of infection spreading within the setting.
- If a child becomes ill whilst at nursery, parents or carers will be contacted immediately and asked to collect their child as soon as possible. During this time, the child will be cared for in a quiet and comfortable area under close supervision until they are collected.
- Children who are unwell must not attend the nursery. In cases of infectious illness, including sickness and diarrhoea, children must remain at home and may only return once they have been **symptom-free for at least 48 hours**.
- Where a contagious illness is identified within the nursery, parents will be informed promptly so they can monitor for symptoms. All equipment, toys and areas that may have been exposed will be cleaned and disinfected thoroughly to reduce the risk of transmission.
- The nursery follows guidance from the National Health Service and the UK Health Security Agency when determining appropriate action, including exclusion periods and infection control measures. Parents may be advised to seek medical guidance where necessary before a child returns to the setting.
- Where a child has been prescribed antibiotics, they **cannot attend nursery for the first 24 hours** of the course. This ensures the child is well enough to participate in the nursery day and helps reduce the risk of infection spreading.
- Parents must inform the nursery as soon as possible if their child is unwell and unable to attend.
- If a child has been given Calpol or any medication to reduce a temperature before attending nursery, **they must remain at home until they are well, temperature-free for 24 hours and no longer requiring medication to manage symptoms**. The same applies where a child is sent home from nursery with a temperature.
- The Nursery Manager retains the discretion to refuse entry to any child who appears unwell, even if an exclusion period has passed or medical advice has been given. This decision will be based on the child's overall wellbeing and their ability to take part in normal nursery activities.
- Parents must inform the nursery if their child has a contagious illness. All information will be handled sensitively and confidentially. The nursery follows current government guidance on exclusion periods for infectious diseases.
- A child's temperature will be taken using a digital thermometer in line with manufacturer guidance. A temperature of 38°C or above will be treated as a high temperature and managed in line with guidance from the National Health Service and monitored appropriately.
- During any outbreak of infectious illness, certain activities that increase the risk of cross-contamination, such as shared sensory play or self-service food, may be temporarily suspended.
- In the event of a medical emergency, an ambulance will be called immediately. Staff will not transport a child in their own vehicle. Parents will be informed without delay and arrangements made to meet at the hospital. A member of staff will accompany the child and take all relevant documentation, including emergency contact details, medical records, care plans and any required medication.
- Any concerns regarding a child's health that may indicate a safeguarding issue will be managed in line with the Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy.

Staff Illness

Staff must not attend work if they are unwell or may pose a risk of infection to others. Staff must follow the same exclusion periods as children, particularly in cases of sickness and diarrhoea and must only return when they are fit to work.

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Hygiene and Infection Control

Hygiene precautions when dealing with body fluids are applied consistently for all children and adults to minimise the risk of infection.

Staff will wear single-use gloves and aprons when changing nappies or handling clothing or materials soiled with blood, saliva, urine, faeces, or vomit.

Any soiled clothing or personal items will be placed in a sealed bag and returned to parents or carers.

All spills of bodily fluids will be cleaned immediately using appropriate disinfectant solutions. Materials used for cleaning will be disposed of safely in line with clinical waste procedures.

Oral Health

The nursery recognises that promoting good oral health in early years is essential for protecting children's teeth and establishing lifelong healthy habits.

We support children's oral health by following guidance from the National Health Service and embedding good practices into daily routines.

This may include providing opportunities for children to learn about oral health through age-appropriate activities, sharing information and guidance with parents and carers, ensuring menus support healthy teeth by limiting sugar and promoting balanced nutrition, and encouraging positive links with local dental services where appropriate.

Immunisations

Early Years Day Nursery Uxbridge has a duty of care to protect the health and wellbeing of all children, families and staff within the setting. This includes taking appropriate steps to reduce the risk of infectious diseases and ensuring a safe environment for everyone.

The nursery will notify parents, carers and staff where there is a known case of an excludable illness within the setting, in line with current public health guidance. We will follow appropriate exclusion periods and infection control measures to limit the spread of illness.

Where possible, the nursery will maintain an up-to-date record of each child's immunisation status. This supports the identification of children who may be at increased risk during an outbreak and enables the nursery to provide timely and relevant information to parents and carers.

We recognise that children attending group settings may have a higher exposure to infectious illnesses. Maintaining accurate records and working in partnership with families supports effective risk management and helps protect all children within our care.

The nursery will support parents and carers by sharing information and guidance on immunisations in line with recommendations from the National Health Service and the UK Health Security Agency. Parents are encouraged to ensure their child's vaccinations are up to date in accordance with national guidance.
