President's Report

The 2014 year in Basketball in Victoria was both rewarding and challenging from many perspectives.

The work being done on updating our constitution to reflect modern governance principles continued through the year and ramped up in early 2015 as you will know.

It has been yet another strong year participation wise with above demographic growth continuing. We continue to address the challenge of court space which is a problem we would wish to have and there is great progress with new courts being delivered and in the pipeline. Wayne Bird continues to do great work with associations and act as a bridge to government in the development of stadiums and additional courts.

Country basketball continues to be a vibrant community with the Country Commission providing strong leadership and support to country members. Country is leading the way with adoption of the on-line registration of participants. The implementation of on-line registration by the Country Commission has seen an increase in membership which brings country Victoria even closer to being the second biggest participant pool in the country, just trailing NSW as a whole. The national registration database is a key Basketball Australia strategy that will ultimately deliver benefits across basketball. While some associations have moved to online individual registration, the continuation of team-based registration is important to some Basketball Victoria metropolitan members and Basketball Victoria is advocating to ensure that the system enables this flexibility and we are assured that it does.

The Victorian Junior Basketball League grows apace with team numbers now north of 1100. The "Girls Got Game" program has been well promoted and supported by the VJBL Commission and has been a success story for basketball.

The Interim Senior Commission has continued as the governing body for senior basketball in Basketball Victoria while the constitution discussions have progressed and the BigV has continued its success story. Team registrations grew in 2014 with the growth continuing into 2015. The awards night held at Etihad Stadium was well attended and the vibe was extremely upbeat with hosts Justin Nelson and Callum Chambers doing a great job MC'ing the event. Congratulations to the Interim Senior Commission Executive and management team for conducting such a high quality competition at a reasonable price!

Our Referees and Officials continue to achieve excellent recognition by being selected to officiate at national and international tournaments and events. Rod Bush's VBRA report lists the details of those officials who are being recognized for their excellent skills. It is also timely to note and congratulate Bill Mildenhall for being the recipient of the 2014 Judy Patching Sports Official of the Year Award – a very worthy recipient of this prestigious award from the Victorian Olympic Council.

High Performance has been very active through the year with 2014's on-court results continuing to reflect exceptionally well

on Basketball Victoria's pathways and development programs. Congratulations and thanks to all involved in the whole of basketball in Victoria.

Inclusion programs are continually challenged by the uncertainty of government funding however the team has continued with its now customary passion to support inclusive programs across the basketball landscape. That said there is so much more that can be done and we must continue to support programs and initiatives that focus on the least blessed within our broad basketball community.

The Basketball Victoria Board was saddened to receive the resignation of a number of long serving and high quality board members throughout the year. In March Vice President Ned Coten resigned to take up a position on the Basketball Australia Board. In August BV Life Member, Mike Bullock, chose to conclude his tenure with the BV Board. In November, James Merlino resigned when he became Deputy Premier. James was advised that he could be conflicted in his Ministerial role if he stayed on the board and it became appropriate to step down. I take this opportunity to express on behalf of members and the Board our heartfelt thanks to Ned, Mike and James for their contribution to basketball. I know they will remain enthusiastic supporters and contributors and are not lost to our sport.

The engagement with member association representatives and commissions has been extensive and rewarding. The consultation process has been extremely beneficial to the drafting of the new constitution and the underpinning commission delegation documents. The commission committee members have provided constructive and challenging feedback that has resulted in the commission charters being much stronger, more empowering and at the same time providing accountability to the participants and members of the commissions as well as to the Basketball Victoria Board. The new constitution will of course be put to the members at the upcoming annual general meeting and there will be more communication around that regarding process for elections, etc. The BV Board has put the quality of the engagement with and support of members ahead of the timeline in the development of the new constitution and I thank all contributors for the input and their patience as we worked through the matters that were raised. The outcome is a constitution that has been very fully discussed and which is supported by strong combined charter and delegation documents that guide the commissions.

Change is difficult for most of us whether we are promoting it or reviewing the proposals. I would particularly like to extend the Board's thanks to the chairs (Darryl Neale, Niall Quinn, Matthew Cowling, Rod Bush and Ron Burgess) and members of the commissions for their constructive and leading roles in the engagement process. I commend the new constitution to you, the members and respectfully recommend its adoption at the Annual General Meeting.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

It is my pleasure to present my 2014 report. Reflecting on what has been an exemplary year for Victorian basketball, a few specific highlights spring to mind. The remarkable growth and popularity of the sport in Victoria has continued unabated. Basketball Victoria Country recorded a 3.4% increase in individual registrations, reporting a figure of 44,376 individual registrations for 2014. The Victorian metropolitan team-based registration figures also showed an overall growth of 4.6%, increasing from 16,236 teams to 16,980 teams!

Other highlights of 2014 included the great Bendigo Spirit team repeating as WNBL champions, the Geelong Basketball Association hosting an outstanding Under 16 Australian junior Championship tournament last July and homegrown Victorian, Dante Exum, beginning his NBA career as the number five draft pick of the Utah Jazz.

Governance

The year has also seen further progress in relation to the adoption of a new, and more contemporary, constitution. There has been significant and extensive stakeholder engagement and feedback opportunities offered throughout the year and we are getting close to delivering the final document for member consideration at the 2015 AGM. This will provide a more robust governance platform to continue structural reform and organisational alignment, resulting in a more focused delivery of strategic and operational objectives.

Strategy

Having completed the second year of our four-year strategic plan, I am pleased to report good progress across the six key strategic pillars. The pillars **People**, **Growth** and **Leadership** all reported with pleasing growth in the skills, size and value of Victorian basketball. The **Inclusion** strategies, although often under external funding pressure, again delivered excellent results and continue to set the benchmarks for embedded inclusive organisational practices. Extensive and essential work has also been undertaken in relation to the critical pillar of **Facilities**. Although the ongoing participant growth rates have resulted in further strain on our existing facility infrastructure, it is pleasing to note that there are currently thirty-three new basketball courts being built in Victoria.

The most progress for the year was made in relation to the strategy pillar of **Awareness**. To promote recognition of basketball as the number one community sport in Victoria, a BV communications department was created and resourced in the second half of the year. I am confident that the new department will lift the quantity and quality of communications both internally and externally in the years to come.

Finance

2014 proved to be another solid year from a financial perspective, with each of the BV and the BV Country business

units reporting an \$85,000 surplus (2.5% of turnover) following small deficits for BV in prior years. The organisation is well positioned with a strong balance sheet and robust liquid assets to avail of development opportunities and assist members as required. In the previous financial year, we made a concerted effort to reduce the amount of receivables held on the balance sheet which has, in turn, significantly increased cash holdings. With a current ratio of 2.5 for Basketball Victoria, this means that our assets are now more than double our liabilities, placing us in a stronger position to further develop our sport.

There was a combined BV/BVC 2014 turnover of just under \$6.8million. Decreases in government funding have been offset by an increase in commercial income secured during the year.

Commercialisation

Specifically, the increased income levels can be attributed to two newly formed major commercial partnerships. AGL commenced a three-year agreement with Basketball Victoria, as did the rebranded and relaunched NBL franchise, Melbourne United. Agreeing to what is the largest commercial partnership in Basketball Victoria's history, Melbourne United should be congratulated for choosing to re-invest in the grass roots of the

sport. There is no question that the partnership is, first and foremost, motivated by the desire for a good business outcome – more members attending more games – and it will, ultimately, be measured by the return derived from this investment. However, the partnership also reflects, and fosters the achievement of, Basketball Victoria's desired goal: to develop stronger, more visible connections between the grassroots and the elite, professional segments of the sport. I acknowledge and thank these new partners for their generous support and involvement.

McDonalds has once again demonstrated its loyalty and commitment to Victorian basketball by continuing to support our junior development and schools programs. Now in its thirty-first year, this prized partnership is still evolving and expanding. Our alliance with basketball manufacturer Molten is also incredibly strong as evidenced by the long-term five-year contract we have in place. We are also greatly indebted to our other highly valued partners, including VicHealth, Sport and Recreation Victoria, Schweppes, SEDA, 2XU, ECHO Australia, the Gorman Foundation and Ultimate Sports. We are very grateful to these organisations for their ongoing commitment and commercial support.

In conclusion, I offer my sincere thanks and praise to the diligent and hardworking BV staff, whose passion and efforts continue to produce such great results. In particular I would like to highlight

the fantastic efforts of my Executive Assistant, Merryn Sholer. Her fantastic work ethic, attention to detail and team focus, combined with her positive and energetic demeanour, make her a pleasure to work with and a invaluable asset.

The Staff Values Committee was the catalyst for the BV staff embarking on a series of workshops throughout the year that has, ultimately, resulted in the development of shared staff values. These values now inform the manner in which BV staff operate: they *lead, are people-focused, act with integrity and are accountable.*

I would also thank the members of the various volunteer commissions and constituent bodies, with whom many I have formed close working relationships. I thank the members of the BV Board, both past and present, for the dedication and guidance they have shown over countless volunteer hours throughout the year. In particular, I thank BV President, Dan Kirtley, for his dedication to Basketball Victoria and his ongoing personal support, wisdom and counsel.

2015 is set to be another year of exciting growth and prosperity for Victorian Basketball. I am greatly looking forward to it!

Strategic Operations

Reflecting back on 2014 I wonder where the time has gone. Sadly our lives are so incredibly busy allowing it to fly past so quickly that we find it difficult to manage our time to stop and reflect? There is much value in rising above that frantic whirlwind of business and existing workloads to see our accomplishments and herald our achievements. It also allows us time to create new beneficial strategies to assist achievement of our vision that move beyond the traditional offerings of our sport with much greater clarity, commitment and success and not be busy for business sake.

This report gives a very brief overview on the progress to date of Basketball Victoria's Strategic Plan.

A key pillar of our Strategic Plan is **people** and our ability to strengthen our capacity and encourage excellence at every level in basketball. A key priority of our Plan is Referees, including a review of their systems, charter and functions. The BV Board has requested a "Commission Chair's Review Committee" be established to look at all BV Commissions, including the VBRA. Education, planning and development of Referees has continued and included improvement in the delivery systems for officiating; provision of leadership, education, training and management for officiating development opportunities; production and dissemination of new rules; development of retention strategies; completion and commencement of a Regional Development Plan and research and access to specialist support for High Performance Officiating.

Victoria's High Performance continues its success with 6x Gold Medals, 2x Silver and 2x Bronze during the 2014 National Championships. A total of 955 Coaches attended BV Coaching Clinics and 750 Victorian Coaches became accredited. Work has been nearly completed with the new Coach Curriculum. All High Performance Coaches are now educated on ASADA via an anti-doping educational tool and provided with an ASC L1 Certification. An All-State Camp, East Coast Challenge, Albury Country Cup and Southern Cross Challenge are still to be held up until mid January 2015.

Basketball Victoria remains dedicated to the continual growth of our athletes, coaches and officials through clinics, camps, education and resources and provides a strong pathway from grassroots to international competition. Strategic planning and information systems have been developed to implement long-term programs for the continued monitoring and enhancement of our game.

Inclusion remains a high priority to ensure basketball is a sport that enables everyone to participate. VicHealth gave us a lifeline and extended our SSAPP funding by a further year to now be completed by 30 June 2015 with much work still to be completed.

We finalised an extensive evaluation of our Inclusive Basketball Strategy (IBS) providing realistic results and future recommendations that build upon our existing



foundations aligned strategically across all levels of the organisation. Statistically, the most identifiable achievements of the IBS include a significant increase in students with disability participating in our programs with approximately 75% of Specialist Schools participating annually. A total of 43 Associations routinely provide inclusive activities and programs ensuring our communities are welcomed, engaged and supported. In 2015, we will have a greater emphasis on linking our school programs to Associations and participants to members creating further ownership, development, opportunities and growth.

We are continuing to promote and develop Wheelchair Basketball with programs now operating at Kilsyth, Gippsland, Bendigo, Ballarat, MSAC, Shepparton, Dandenong and Geelong.

The VJBL, supported by BV, responded to the ongoing drop off of females in basketball by creating the Girls Got Game program in the hope of retaining our current VJBL athletes in basketball for life. In addition to this program, we nominated 6 young women aged 16-19 years to be involved in a leadership program with Game Changers.

A Gippsland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander program was held focusing on supporting and developing local participants in leadership positions and basketball development programs culminating in a celebration of Indigenous culture within a Basketball environment. A Big V Indigenous Round will now be incorporated in the 2014/15 Big V season.

BV has engaged in various other initiatives designed to broaden participation, for example Fair Go Sport and our draft Transgender and Intersex Player Policy. This has been beneficial for the IBS by reinforcing efforts for basketball to become more welcoming to all community members.

By valuing diversity and encouraging participation and access via a variety of participatory opportunities enables BV and our members to contribute physically, socially and fully to the welfare and health of Victorian's.



Strategic Operations

With Inclusion funding ceasing by 30 June 2015, the committed level of investments BV and our affiliated Associations are prepared to make will underpin our continued success and maintain our leadership capabilities as a truly inclusive sport.

We want to **grow** our sport with more players, more people, more basketball, more community engagement and healthy outcomes. June 2014 saw the national re-launch of the Aussie Hoops program including new national registration processes, participant packs, price structure and marketing collateral. Data is expected to grow and become more accurate as the program expands and all delivery Centre's move to the online system. McDonald's Hoop Time continues to grow with 42,309 participants from 652 schools participating. The Gippsland Regional Plan has been completed and actions commenced in the region.

BV successfully negotiated an insurance program, with only a nominal increase in 2014. Additional sponsorship was acquired in 2014, with most of the benefit being carried into 2015. All State teams, including the Victorian Wheelchair Basketball teams are now administered through the BV Office.

Our Victorian Basketball Census 2013 was completed, highlighting an estimated 186,234 formal or registered players within our Basketball Associations. Disappointingly it highlighted a large disparity between male (65.6%) and female (34.4%) players enforcing the urgent need to address this area of our game. The overall response rate from our Associations was 45.6%, following a 60.4% response in 2012. It is critical for BV and our basketball community to provide realistic results to enable us to analyse, plan and respond to issues and prioritise our organisational systems and structures to influence positive change.

The VJBL had a record 1,154 teams compete in the 2013/14 season with 1,220 currently entered in 2014/15 and more than 50,000 spectators/players watching the finals action. The first 3 on 3 VJBL tournament was held with over 200 players. Forty-six Associations, 11 divisions and a total of 2,415 players, 272 coaches and 128 Referees ensured the 2014 Big V season was a success. 2014 was the second year of the Victorian Youth Championships (SEABL D League and Big V State Youth League merger) and interim Victorian Senior Basketball Commission.

More and better **facilities** in which to play will eventually allow us to rid ourselves of waiting lists and turning nobody away. This will have a positive social and economic impact on our sport. Four projects are currently under construction and many more are in the planning phase with all current and future developments incorporating Universal Design principles, which covers the accessibility of all facilities.

Identified projects include: Stage 1 at Werribee is due to be completed early 2015 with 8 new courts including a 1500 seat

show court with Stage 2 increasing the facility to a 12 court venue at a total cost of \$47million. Keilor is gaining 3 new courts increasing its capacity to a 6-court venue including a small show court. Project cost is \$6.2million and is due for completion mid 2016.

Casey Indoor Leisure Centre will have an additional 4 courts including a 1500 seat show court due for commencement mid 2015. Ballarat (Wendouree Indoor Centre) will have 6 new courts plus offices, facilities and a 3000 seat show court, plus refurbishment of existing 2 courts beginning mid 2016. Commencing mid 2016 will be an additional 3 new courts, a 3000 seat show court, new administration facilities for basketball and netball at the Bendigo Schweppes Centre.

Promoting **awareness** and recognition of Basketball's popularity at all levels of government and throughout the community will be realised with the employment of Rebekah Lacy as our new Communications Manager. We know the work required in the technologically savvy world of today to keep abreast of communication channels and expectations is paramount for basketball. A major strategy is the re-development and upgrade of the Website including a thorough review of content and an audit of all Social Media Channels, format and content. A position description has been developed for a Communications Coordinator and is currently advertised for start in the new year.

Work continues to transition Associations away from FIBA Organiser and other local management systems to the Online Member and Competition Management system that now forms the backbone of The Basketball Network (TBN). This process will improve the capture of data that is not available through the BV Census. The BVC Registration Project has captured approximately 74% of player registrations online: 99 Associations are at various stages of implementation.

Building the business of basketball by providing a strategic focus, developing and strengthening partnerships and reinforcing our strong and united community is paramount for **leadership** capabilities. BVC has formalised partnership agreements with all Regional Sports Assemblies further strengthening the supportive regional links. A History Project has commenced providing documented evidence of the history of basketball in Victoria. The project enables us to capture stories via film and archival footage and memorabilia of historical and present day data including the installation of an honour wall in the SBC corridor.

Regular review of our Plan continues to enable us to adapt and change our methodology to ensure continued excellence and achievement towards being **the world's best sporting community**.

With a number of new partnerships and key renewals signed throughout the year, Basketball Victoria enjoyed a successful year commercially. The following is a summary of our commercial successes in 2014:

McDonald's – Partnership renewed in January 2014 for a further year, taking the term of partnership to an incredible 31 years. McDonald's continue as BV's Official Quick Serve Restaurant and naming rights sponsor of the following programs/ events:

- McDonald's Cup
- McDonald's Super Mini Series
- McDonald's National Junior Classic

Molten – New 5-year deal commenced in January 2014. In addition to an increased cash investment over the previous term, the deal also includes an annual in-kind allotment of custom competition balls for various leagues & programs. In addition, BV will receive a royalty on each VJBL ball sold at retail. Molten continue as the exclusive ball used in all BV competitions and events, in addition to having naming rights to all BV 3x3 competitions.

Melbourne United – Three-year deal commenced in August 2014. Deal includes a cash investment, in addition to in-kind components consisting of a fully catered 8-seat corporate box for each home game, reserve tickets to each home game, annual game sponsorship package for use by BV & McDonald's to showcase the McDonald's Hoop Time All Star State Grand Finals, as well as several player appearances throughout each year. Under the terms of the Agreement, Melbourne United become the Naming Rights Sponsor of the VJBL. Melbourne United will also be partnering BV's High Performance and Coach Development Programs, as well as becoming Principal Partner of the Southern Cross Challenge.

AGL – Three-year provisional deal commenced in November 2014 for AGL to become the official Energy Partner of BV. Structure of the deal includes a guaranteed Year-1 investment, with subsequent years subject to achievement of KPIs. Under the terms of the Agreement, AGL became the Naming Rights Sponsor of the Victoria Men's and Women's teams that compete in the National Wheelchair Basketball League (teams to carry the designation 'Powered by AGL' for the 2015 season). AGL will also be an official Sponsor of other BV inclusion programs such as the VicHealth Cup and the ECHO All Abilities Association Tournament.

Ultimate Sports (Flooring Maintenance) – Three-year deal commenced in January 2014. Ultimate Sports have naming rights to a series of BV Community Coaching Clinics, promoting Ultimate Sports' community basketball brand (Ultimate Taking Care of Basketball, UTCB). The investment from Ultimate Sports



will allow BV to offer a number of community coaching clinics free of charge.

ECHO Australia (Disability Employment Services) – New 3-year deal commenced in September 2014. ECHO are the Naming Rights Sponsor of the All Abilities Association Tournament and the Presenting Partner of the VicHealth Cup. BV will also assist ECHO to promote a co-branded traineeship program (SportWorks), which will afford applicants with a disability the opportunity to gain meaningful employment.

Schweppes – New 3-year deal commenced in April 2014 for Schweppes to continue as the exclusive beverage partner of BV. Deal includes an annual provision of a significant amount of packaged product for use at various BV programs and events, plus a rebate on sales.

Action Floors (Floor installation) – One-year Bronze Support Partner deal commenced in September 2014. As a Support Partner (non-exclusive), Action will receive recognition on the BV website and have limited use of the BV logo on certain promotional collateral.

Basketball Operations

The following report highlights another action packed, successful year for the Basketball Operations team in 2014.

Aussie Hoops

Our Aussie Hoops Development program had 2,117 participants complete the program in 2014 at 36 country and 25 metropolitan Associations and schools. Every new participant received an Aussie Hoops pack, containing a branded basketball, singlet and backpack. Associations have continued to increase their team participation numbers as a result of introducing the program.

Skill, Fun and Play

Skill, Fun and Play, which is a program conducted within schools and forms part of the Victorian Aussie Hoops Development program, held clinics offering a participation opportunity to 20,801 primary school children from 127 schools. BV continued to work with SEDA students and local Association coaches to deliver Skill, Fun and Play clinics to provide an awareness of the local Association and our great game.

McDonald's HoopTime

Another record breaking year for our McDonald's HoopTime program, for the first time exceeding 40,000 participants for the year! With 42,309 participants (up from 39,299 in 2013), over 203 HoopTime days (up 3 on 2013), catering for 652 primary schools in 2014, with 4,701 teams (up from 4,370 in 2013) illustrates both success of the program and growth. The amount of positive feedback received provides great evidence that the program continues to be a success, by providing basketball players at an early age an introduction to our sport.

Ultimate Taking Care of Basketball

In partnership with Ultimate Sports Enterprises we conducted a series of free Aussie Hoops player clinics and coaching clinics to selected Affiliated Associations around the State. The Ultimate Taking Care of Basketball program was aimed to assist Associations; market our sport, recruit athletes and train coaches. In the first year of the program we conducted 4 clinics with over 160 participants.

Victorian College Championship

The Victorian College Championship continues to be a solid school basketball development competition with 68 secondary schools (226 teams) competing in 2014.

3on3 Challenge

2014 witnessed the second ever 3on3 Challenge conducted by BV with 24 primary schools participating, 107 teams, over a two (2) day carnival held at the State Basketball Centre in June 2014.

Coach Education

Coach Education implemented its new Nationally Accredited programs in 2014 through which Basketball Victoria leads for the nation with new on-line learning tools now available.

The following new programs were enacted in 2014;

- Level 0 became – Basketball for Everyone – entry level
- Level One became – Community Coach – Aussie Hoops level
- Level Two became – Club Coach – Coaching Principles Part 1
- Level Three became – Association Coach – Coaching Principles Part 1+
- Performance Coach was implemented as a new level – Coaching Principles Part 2
- Master Coach was implemented as the highest level – Advanced Coaching Principles

CTI Melbourne United also commenced the funding of the delivery of free Level 0 courses to participants, with 16 coaches put through the program in 2014. 2015 will see over 500 coaches accredited through this program.

Coach education continued to be a high priority in 2014. Participation rates in 2014 courses were at the highest level in five years 3,076 (4,024 in 2013) coaches attended a variety of BV conducted coaching courses and clinics, which included;

- 15 Level 1 Courses
- Mastermind Clinic – with the following presenters; Lindsay Gaze, Trevor Gleeson, Gordan McLeod, Andrej Lemanis, Alan Westover and Grant Wallace

- Individual Coaching clinics conducted by;

 - Dan Majerle
 - Tony Ronzone
 - Justin Schueller

School Holiday Camps

Basketball Victoria's 2014 Development Camps were once again very popular with 2,227 (2,726 in 2013) athletes attending the camps in a busy development calendar.

BV Camps continue to operate in a competitive market with numerous private third party providers and affiliated associations hosting their own camps and programs that service the membership.

McDonald's Cup

McDonald's Cup had 93 teams from 37 schools compete.

SEDA

SEDA (Sports, Education & Development Australia) continued to flourish with classes operating out of Sunshine, Nunawading, Broadmeadows, Dandenong, Traralgon, Ballarat, Bendigo, Shepparton and Geelong. Students completed their Level 1 Coaching and Officiating courses allowing them to assist HoopTime & HoopTime Mini's days, Skill, Fun and Play clinics, VCC and McDonalds Cup tournaments. The year 11 and 12 students provide a great assistance to BV by enabling us to reach more primary school students with our introduction to basketball programs.



Australian Junior Championships

Victoria continued to dominate at the Australian Junior Championships winning six (6) gold medals, two (2) silver medals and a bronze medal.

East Coast Challenge

Competing against U16 and U18 Women's and Men's teams from NSW Metro, SA Metro and the ACT, the Victorian Metropolitan National Intensive Training Program (NITP) won the East Coast Challenge held in Sydney in January 2014. The touring group consisted of 8 teams, (98 athletes), competing in the U16 and U18 boys and girls competition, overseen by 25 coaching and support staff.

Southern Cross Challenge

Victoria Country and Victoria Metropolitan U14 and U15 girls and boys participated in the 2014 Southern Cross Challenge, held at the State Basketball Centre in January 2014. The tournament, like the East Coast Challenge, provides a unique development opportunity for identified athletes, coaches and referees to participate against the best in a wonderful environment. Teams participated from: Victoria Country, Victoria Metropolitan, South Australia Country, South Australia Metropolitan, ACT, Western Australia Country and Western Australia Metropolitan.



Country Cup

Victoria Country teams, in all age groups, competed in the Australian Basketball Country Cup Championships in January 2014 in Albury with outstanding results.

NPP/NITP

The NITP continued to operate successfully as it has in previous years. In addition, the National Performance Program (NPP) has continued to produce very good Victorian players and coaches for Australian teams at World Championships and Olympic Games. Country NPP/NITP athletes continue to receive weekly training through satellite hubs and Metropolitan NPP/NITP athletes continue to receive weekly training at the State Basketball Centre on Sunday afternoons. Great support continues for the High Performance program from our service providers; the Bounce Health Group, Core Advantage, Custom College Recruiting and SportsLife IQ.

BV History Committee

We have commenced a whole range of projects to better capture and celebrate our sports history, this includes in no particular order;

- Completion of a time line of Victorian basketball notable events;
- Completion of office bearers, life members and award winner's honour boards in the entry walkway of the office;
- Completion of the set-up and operation of the following meeting rooms at the Basketball Victoria office; the President's Room, the Watson Room and the Gaze Room;
- Video interviews captured with Betty Watson and Lindsay Gaze;
- Portraits of Betty Watson and Lindsay Gaze completed;
- Commencement of the collection of all past state team lists and team photographs;
- Completion of the Walk of Honour at the State Basketball Centre of notable recent Victorian Olympians;
- Commencement of lists of past athletes and coaches who have represented Australia; and
- Collection and cataloguing of various items of memorabilia and photographs.

We are also in the planning phase of a number of exciting new projects to continue to best celebrate and capture our sports rich history.

2015 is expected to be another busy year for our Basketball Operations team as we continue to aim high and provide best practice service to our community.

Basketball Victoria Country continued in 2014 to work towards completion of Key Performance Indicators reflecting our objectives and actions under the Basketball Victoria Strategic Plan.

Key projects were developed around:

• Capitation/Online Registration Project

This ambitious project was developed from a resolution in late 2013 by the BVC Commission that further progressed the BV Strategic Plan Objective in this area.

This project, which is easily the largest of its type in Australian Basketball, did not meet the KPI to have all 108 Associations offering compulsory Online Registration to their participants by 1 October 2014. At that date approximately 75% of the total BVC database was covered by an Online Registration System, however this only equated to the top 37% of Associations.

BVC extended the project into 2015 with clear goals for each Association.

• 2nd BVC Jamboree

BVC have historically operated a Jamboree for Associations in the U12 age group and also attended a Jamboree in Albury operated by a third party. In 2014, BVC determined that they would not attend the Albury Jamboree but operated a second Jamboree under the BVC name and worked with the Warrnambool Council and Warrnambool BA to successfully conduct a Jamboree for U12's in the South West. This Jamboree complimented the existing BVC Echuca Jamboree and offered a further 120 U12's a taste of Jamboree Basketball. The Jamboree is also an important pathway for aspiring referees and young referee coaches.

This also provided an opportunity to market the game to the South West area and in particular, Warrnambool.

• Coach Education

KPI's developed and met by BVC for 2014

- Target 140+ coaches to complete Level 1, 171 coaches were accredited to this level by BVC in 2014.
- Target 20+ coaches to complete Level 2, 25 coaches were accredited to this level by BVC in 2014.

BVC also developed a long term goal to have all Country Championship coaches accredited to at least a Level 1 by the 2016 Country Championship series. This goal/KPI has been redefined with a change to the accreditation system at Basketball Australia level and delivery of Coach Education across Victoria being delivered by the BV Operations Area.

• Grow and retain BVC Championship and CBL team entries

BVC conducted a thorough review of the delivery of all Country Championships and the Country Championship structure, developing a paper with recommendations for consideration by the BVC Game Development Committee. This was completed and the recommendations of that Committee was considered in 2014 by the BVC Commission. The recommendations were then adopted and changes introduced in 2015.

• Develop a BVC School Holiday Program

Program developed for the July School Holidays in 2014 targeting member Associations which do not operate school holiday programs. 6 Regional Centres delivered a BVC School Holiday Program. A notable area of success was in Drouin and also in the Bellarine Peninsula, with good numbers recorded/attending across each centre.

• Gippsland Regional Plan

This plan was finalised and delivered with 4 key recommendations. BVC will continue to deliver on the recommendations with further work required in a key area of female participation. BVC continue to seek funding to assist in developing female participation numbers and was unsuccessful in funding applications through VicHealth in 2014/2015.

A research project regarding female participation, to establish 'base participation' and 'barriers to participation', was completed in 2014, with a report provided to the BV Board.

Coach education was also identified by Associations as being very important to the continued success of domestic basketball and this was included in our Coach Education Strategy.

BVC also produced a paper with discussion points after concerns were raised regarding different pathways available for players, coaches and officials. Meetings were conducted in the Gippsland area and this will continue to be progressed in 2015.

BVC relaunched the ClubHelp website through the Gippsland Plan Process with assistance from Chris Stanlake at Gippsport, who attended a BVC Workshop for Associations.

• Surf Coast Basketball

Assistance was provided to develop an Association operated by a volunteer committee from the existing competition operated by the Surf Coast Council. This area continues to develop and currently there are approximately 500 participants weekly and another 200 participants competing as a club in Basketball Geelong's domestic competition.

• Development/Growth of Future Stars competition

The Under 12 Country Championship has developed into a lead program for BVC and was conducted for the second year in a row by our hosts, the Traralgon Amateur Basketball Association. An independent Economic Assessment was conducted around

the event. This three day event, as part of the April School Holidays, was identified as having an economic impact of just under \$2m for the Traralgon area.

This event has assisted in identifying to LGA's, the importance of attracting basketball events to the Regional Areas. Over 60 teams from across Regional Victoria competed in Traralgon and Churchill over the three days.

• Referee Education

BVC continue to work through the BVC Referee Development Plan initiated by Jason Kelly and the BVC Referee Committee. With Jason's departure in June and the appointment of Karin Berrysmith to the role in October, there was some delay in completing Key Performance targets as the role was vacant for 3 months, however Karin has had some major successes in the latter part of 2014, in particular:

- Benalla BA, which with Karin's assistance, developed a Referee Program which ultimately was recognised by BVC by winning the BVC Small Association Referee Program of the Year for 2014.
- Further developed the BVC Online Referee Licensing process
- Developed Referees for the Country Basketball League and worked with the three CBL Referee Commissioners to partner with the U16 and U18 Country Championships as a pathway to CBL.
- Continued to develop our social media platform in this area
- Increased visits to Associations



Aussie Hoops

2014 saw the Aussie Hoops program go through some massive changes with Basketball Australia choosing to re-launch the whole program in the month of June!

The program received a brand new website, (www.aussiehoops.com.au) there was a new logo created, Lauren Jackson and Patty Mills were signed up as the program's first ambassadors, there was a postcode locator tool added to the Aussie Hoops website that listed every Aussie Hoops program in Australia, and the participant pack was redesigned with new colors and PEAK became an official sponsor and supplier of the packs. The biggest change to the program was online registrations. Via the brand new Aussie Hoops website, all participant registrations to a program went through the Postcode locator tool.

With so many changes taking place, participant numbers were a little bit lower in 2014 in comparison to what they were in 2013, 556 participants lower, but they were higher than our figures for 2012, 412 participants higher.

Currently Basketball Victoria Country has 16 Aussie Hoops Centre's running a program.

To date we've had 627 participants come through one of the Centre's programs, and with more Centre's getting ready to roll out programs in Term 3 and 4, I would expect to see the Basketball Victoria Country Aussie Hoops figures getting back into the 2,000 participant mark by the end of the year!

BVC staff and operations

Whilst stability of staff was a large factor in the development of BVC programs and the successes in meeting key targets. As previously reported Jason Kelly departed the Organisation and after a recruitment process, Karin Berrysmith was appointed to the BVC Referee Development Officer role.

BVC was also able to fill the vacant role of Basketball Development Officer for the Greater Western Region, with Trevor Newcombe from the BV Office being appointed to the role in May 2014. Trevor commenced working with the 31 Associations in this area with some immediate success.

The appointment of Trevor to the Greater Western Region was one of the final steps in meeting the Regionalisation model recommended by the BVCC Review in 2010.

Basketball Victoria Country Commission

At the BVC AGM conducted in May 2014, Corey Mulqueen, Tony Long and Brett Rolfe were elected to 2 year Commission positions and joined Chair Matthew Cowling and Bill Jeffs as elected Commissioners for BVC. Alan Garraway continued as a BV Appointed Commission member and was joined in this role by Shelley Lambert in July. Matt Agterhuis was co-opted for a further term at the first Commission meeting following the AGM

Due to a multitude of commitments and also other opportunities, Corey Mulqueen was not able to continue in his role of elected Commission member and stood down in July 2014. Chair, Matthew Cowling noted Corey's exceptional contribution to BVC citing the introduction of the Commission from the BVCC review in 2010. Corey was an original member of the BVC Commission.

Basketball Victoria Country Affiliation 2014

106 Associations were affiliated with Basketball Victoria Country in 2014 which is 2 down on previous years. Hamilton BA was previously recorded as being affiliated at Junior and Senior level. In 2014 the entities merged to create one Affiliated Association delivering both Senior and Junior programs. Whittlesea Kinglake BA which changed its name to Whittlesea Senior BA discontinued their affiliation with BVC in early 2014.

4 Associations, currently in recess but remain affiliated are; Stratford, Rosedale, Hopetoun and Boort. Whilst not officially going into recess, no basketball competition was conducted in Beaufort in 2014 and the BVC Basketball Development Officer for that Region is working with a volunteer to attempt to get a competition going again.

There were 44,305 registered participants in 2014. This figure surpasses the 2013 figure of 42,902, the 2012 figure of 40,930 and the 2011 figure of 38,299 and equates to an approximate 3.27% increase in registered participants in 2014, slightly under the target of 4% growth in participants.

For the first time in many years we have a naming right sponsor through Basketball Victoria. This year we have acquired a sponsor with all money received to support our Associations. This has also allowed us to employ Lyn Payet whose role is to engage with all Associations and help in any way she can. Lyn has a wealth of knowledge and is only a phone call away.

I would like to make a special mention and a thank you to all the referees who officiate on a Friday night. At times I know we don't agree with all the calls, but these referees are learning, just like the players who also make mistakes such as missing a simple lay up. Special thanks to Lexie Lattanzio and Anthony O'Brien for managing and teaching our VJBL junior panel referees. This is the most successful referees development program in Australia and has started the careers of some of our Olympic referees. This year there were 162 qualified referees used throughout the season. At this year's national championships the VJBL panel referees who attended had outstanding results officiating in the grand finals. Some

Associations claim it is a burden to supply the referees as per the VJBL condition of entry however development of referees should be a high priority for all Associations. It was seen as a major strategy for Basketball Victoria.

There was a focus at this year's finals to make it enjoyable for both players and spectators. With additional venues used to lighten the traffic load we had terrific reports from those attending. We had 26,773 people attend the VJL & VC finals along with record numbers at our Regional finals. There were some very close games decided by a few points. The sportsmanship displayed by all should be commended. It's a credit to all in the sport

The Girls Got Game program is now developing into a brand that can be used to encourage girls to play our great game and is now working in Associations which have become involved in the program. Kim Round is the driving force with her band of volunteers making it all happen, for that I would like to thank them, and I would suggest all Associations become involved. It will help improve the numbers of girls playing.

In the last month the VJBL Commission have been heavily involved with Basketball Victoria developing new Charters for all delegated bodies including Big V & VBRA. There has been good discussion with give and take by all Organisations, to achieve the best outcomes for the sport. Once we complete our discussions and complete recommendations for the charter we will forward it to all Associations for feedback before it is voted on at a Basketball Victoria meeting of all Associations.

Another busy year! In summary:

Meetings: These have been streamlined and operate within firm time periods. Our sub-committee structure was retained, with the Grass Roots, Elite, Advisory, Education, Scoretable and VBRA Tribunal Committees continuing to operate independently. The decision was made to not require representatives from these committees to attend bi-monthly VBRA meetings, but rather, give them the alternative to attend any meeting (with prior notice of the items needing to be discussed) and/or, submit a written report of their activities. All meeting papers are now held online to make them available to Board Members to review, comment upon and/or amend, prior to attending meetings. We have experimented (successfully) with electronic attendance by members.

Finances: Pat Crowe continues to oversee our financial operations in his usual efficient and careful manner. The VBRA finances are entirely transparent, we forward reports to BV on a monthly basis, and are audited each year. We use referee licence fees to administer the affairs of the VBRA, contribute to the BV Referee Development Officer salary, fund the State Rules Interpreter, contribute to the cost of officials who represent the State and to subsidise various Education and Development Programs.

Our Rules of Management. In these we ensure that our members continue to receive the support and guidance of the VBRA, while acknowledging the capacity of the changing governance of some larger Associations to reinforce and deliver such change. The Rules of Management will need to be reviewed again in the light of proposed Constitutional changes within BV.

The **Grass Roots committee** continues to do great work on policy and resource development. A range of resources (Power Points, upgrade courses, video clips, VBRA policies etc.) were distributed to affiliated Associations on a USB drive. These will be regularly reviewed and maintained by our Education Committee to ensure currency. Sarah Bradbury has stepped down as Chairperson of this committee due to her work commitments, but will continue as a committee member. We thank her for her work in the role over several years. The group has decided to meet monthly to provide more continuity to their activities.

A new series of awards has been instituted with a focus on domestic referees in Associations. They acknowledge the work done by senior and junior domestic referees as well as Large, Medium and Small Size Associations with their respective development programs.

We must continue to recognise the continuing achievements of our members each year. In the past year we have seen several members receive appointments to International games, namely Michael Ayles, Chris Reid, Robyn Manhire, and Sarah Carey. Jon Chapman also received his FIBA badge in December. We continue to see our members appointed to NBL and WNBL finals series, and to officiate in the SEABL and Big V finals. Michael Ayles received the N.B.L. Referee of the Year award; Jason Kelly received the W.N.B.L. Referee of the Year award. Well done to both!

Similarly, congratulations go to Bill Mildenhall for his appointment as a Technical Advisor to F.I.B.A. (as a member of

the FIBA Technical Commission) and his fine work at the FIBA World Cup for Men (previously known as the FIBA Men's World Championships) in Spain – a personal honour as well as an honour for our Association, our State and indeed, our Country.

We have continued to consult directly with BV in our review of the role of technical officials within our game. It has been a rather long (and at times arduous!) task but we are definitely making progress. In a similar vein, we have participated in several meetings between BV and Chairs of its other subgroups (Big V and VJBL), in relation to proposed constitutional changes. The meetings have been open and positive with all participants working towards what will be the best solution for our sport for the future.

BV have also supported our activities financially with direct contributions to the costs associated with providing support to branches facing difficulties as well as moving our member data base into the Sporting Pulse system. In addition, they have committed an increased level of funding for referee development in their 2015 budget. We acknowledge and appreciate their support.

We have also been part of a consultative process working to establish a new Referee/Referee Coach Policy/Agreement with Big V. While not all our suggestions were actioned, we feel the final document is definitely a step in the right direction and look forward to ongoing connection and consultation in the development of future agreements.

The VBRA held a very successful planning day in September where we listed and prioritised our concerns and developed some strategies as to how they, with the ongoing support of BV and all affiliated bodies, could be effectively addressed. These findings have been passed on to the BV Board, Elite Leagues and other stakeholders.

Pat Crowe stepped down from his position on the VBRA Board. Pat has been a stalwart of the Board for over 8 years and is well recognised and acknowledged for his financial acumen and attention to detail. He will remain in his position of VBRA Referee Administrator. Sean Gottlieb also stood down from the Board after 4 years service. We thank Pat and Sean sincerely for their respective contributions.

We lost two Life Members during the year – Jeff Sprunt and Jimmy Ralph. We acknowledge their respective contributions over many years.

In closing, I thank the members for the privilege of being President for the past year and to the many past and present Board members who have, and continue to, faithfully serve this Association.

My thanks also go to the Convenors and members of the sub-committees that support the Board, to Ron Burgess our State Rules Interpreter, our Life Members, the regions and branches and all of the members across the State.

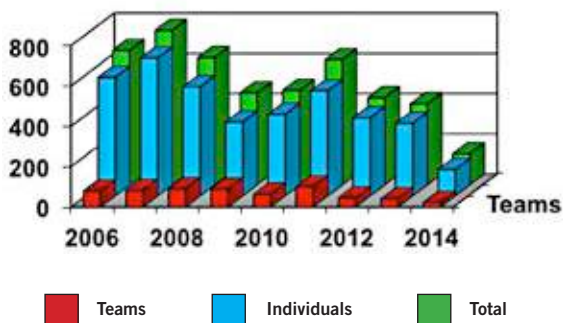
Tribunal Report

2014 saw a slight drop in Tribunals. This was very pleasing indeed as it continued the trend over the last 10 years.

Approximately 346 individuals and 54 teams were found guilty by Tribunals of 1 or more offences. This is a small drop in individuals reported but a disappointing increase in teams. Most of the teams were placed on bonds and some individuals also received bonds. No life bans were imposed.

There was also a small drop in spectators in spectators appearing before the Tribunal with 18 this year. Of the 17 coaches found guilty of offences, a number of those were also parents of children involved in the game. It was hoped that the trend towards lower spectator numbers over the last few years will continue.

The following chart indicates the trends over the last 10 years.



Of the 10 appeals considered by the Basketball Victoria Appeals Officer, only 3 were granted re-hearings, two on the ground of new evidence being available that was not available at the time of the original hearing and the other one on proper notice not having been given for the hearing.

The Member Protection Tribunal dealing with screening issues and discrimination, vilification and harassment in matters of gender, race and other similar categories dealt with 5 matters, mostly racial and sexual vilification or harassment. Fortunately, its work was minimal this year.

In August a very successful Tribunal Conference was held with approximately 50 in attendance. The main agenda item at the Conference was a periodical review of the Tribunal By-laws and the system generally. Associations and those involved in Tribunals were invited to submit items for discussion. The Conference recommended a number of changes and those have been drafted into the By-laws for consideration at the Annual General Meeting in 2015.

I thank all our volunteers for the countless hours they have spent in organising and sitting on Tribunals and in particular Denyse Galle formerly from Knox Tribunal who also assisted me in writing up the Tribunal Report.

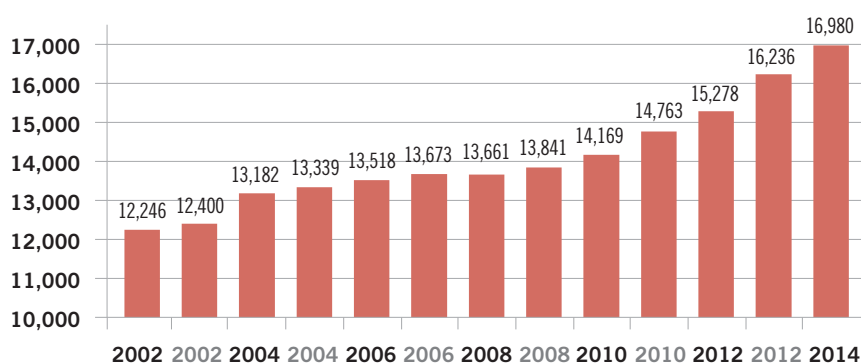

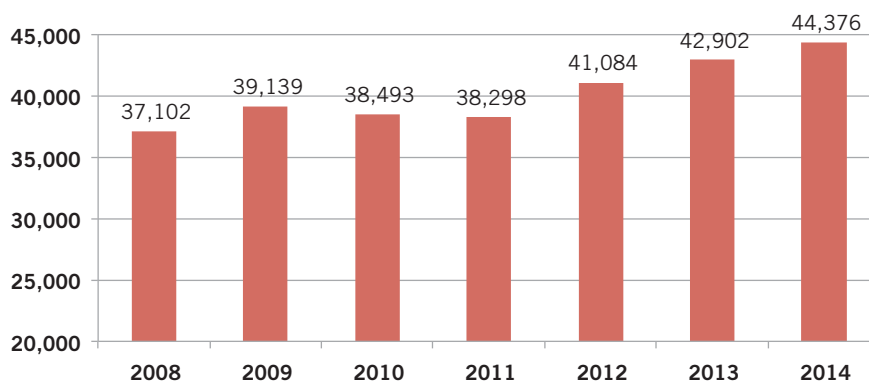

The financial statements cover Basketball Victoria Inc. as an individual entity. Basketball Victoria Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in Victoria under the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*.

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

Basketball Victoria Inc. has elected to become a reporting entity from 1 January 2014. On transition to AIFRS, there are no adjustments to equity or profit or loss between previous Australian GAAP and AIFRS.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(b) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised on a straight line basis over the financial year.

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

When grant revenue is received whereby the Association incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue is recognised when it becomes receivable on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Other revenue is recognised when the right to receive the revenue has been established.

(c) Revenue and other income continued

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost, independent or directors' valuation. All assets excluding freehold land and buildings, are depreciated over their useful lives to the Association.

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Plant and Equipment	5-33%
Leasehold improvements	6.6%

The assets' residual values, depreciation methods and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

(g) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

(h) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than twelve months after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

(h) Employee benefits continued

Employee benefits are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date regardless of the classification of the liability for measurement purposes under AASB 119.

(i) Operating leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(j) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

(k) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

During the current year, the Association adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory. The adoption of these Standards has not had a significant impact on the recognition, measurement and disclosure of transactions.

(l) New accounting standards for application in future periods

The AASB has issued new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods. The committee members have decided against early adoption of these Standards, but do not expect the adoption of these standards to have any significant impact on the reported position or performance of the Association.
