

BURGUNDY

Burgundy is both a wine-growing and agricultural land whose vineyards renowned worldwide are listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

BURGUNDY'S VINEYARDS

The Burgundy vineyard covers approximately 30,000 hectares across the departments of Yonne, Côte-d'Or, Saône-et-Loire, and Rhône, stretching nearly 250 km from north to south.

The "Bourgogne" Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée and its variations apply only to wines harvested and vinified within the vineyard boundaries.

The vineyards are dominated by Pinot Noir (50% of plantings) for red wines and Chardonnay (45%) for white wines. These major grape varieties are complemented by Aligoté and Gamay.



The diversity of its terroirs and climates, recognized by UNESCO, is what gives Burgundian wines their richness and singular character.

BEAUNE – 5 MINUTES AWAY

In the heart of the vineyards, Beaune is the capital of Burgundy wines and an essential stop for lovers of heritage and the art of living. Famous for its Hospices, a flamboyant Gothic jewel of the 15th century, the town charms visitors with its picturesque streets, prestigious wine cellars, and welcoming atmosphere. Between tastings, culture, and historical discovery, Beaune embodies Burgundian elegance and tradition.

CHALON-SUR-SAÔNE – 30 MINUTES AWAY

Around thirty minutes from Beaune, Chalon-sur-Saône captivates with its riverside charm and warm atmosphere. A city of art and history, it is known as the birthplace of Nicéphore Niépce, inventor of photography, and offers rich architectural heritage, including Saint-Vincent Cathedral and its half-timbered houses. Its lively quays, renowned market, and many restaurants invite you to discover a vibrant and gourmet Burgundy in the heart of the Côte Chalonnaise.

DIJON – 40 MINUTES AWAY

Former capital of the Dukes of Burgundy, Dijon stands out for its remarkable architectural heritage and dynamic cultural life. Its private mansions, the Palace of the Dukes, and its cathedral bear witness to a prestigious past, while its market halls and winding streets reflect the local art of living. A gastronomic city par excellence, Dijon is also the starting point of the Route des Grands Crus, offering privileged access to Burgundy's finest vineyards.
