Recognition and Affiliation

Western Reformed Seminary is an approved agency of the Great Western Presbytery and General Synod of the Bible Presbyterian Church for the training of its ministers and laymen.

Academic Accountability



Western Reformed Seminary is a full member of the Association of Reformed Theological Seminaries (ARTS). Full membership in this organization is limited to those seminaries that have undergone a thorough peer review by the other members of the Association and its Commission on Accreditation. While ARTS has not sought recognition from the federal Department of Education, it judges its members by standards as those required by accrediting agencies that are so recognized. ARTS certifies that its member seminaries meet high academic standards and align with the biblical, Reformed faith. Since the Department of Education does not recognize ARTS, the transfer of WRS credits to other institutions is at the receiving institution's discretion. Furthermore, ARTS has recently been endorsed by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) following thorough reviews and inspections, thereby validating the quality of education at its member schools. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement

WRS is also recognized by the U.S. Bureau of Immigration and Customs Enforcement as an academic institution approved to issue F-1 student visa applications. Also, the Federal I.R.S. has granted the non-profit status, thus making all contributions to the seminary tax-deductible.

WRS is recognized by the Association of Certified Biblical Counselors for preparing candidates for certification through ACBC.



WRS is also recognized by the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI). Courses taken at WRS may be used to satisfy the biblical studies requirement to gain or maintain ACSI certification for Christian teachers.

Tracking Quality of Education

Learning Outcomes and Rubrics

Below are some examples of how Western Reformed Seminary tracks quality of education and the means for continual assessment and improvement.

A learning outcome is defined as a statement describing the knowledge, skills, values, dispositions, attitudes, and/or experiences that students should acquire through completion of a course or program of study. Program outcomes are located on the degree programs page: <https://www.wrs.edu/degree-programs>.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) are developed by faculty and approved by the administration. Intended learning outcomes are stated in measurable terms. Faculty develop measurable learning outcomes for students, implement plans to support students in meeting these outcomes, and assess what students have learned, the means by which they learned, and the effectiveness of the learning process. Student Learning Outcomes are posted in each course's information/syllabus and are likewise used to evaluate the course's success at the conclusion of instruction. Small Faculty-to-Student Ratio

WRS is a seminary in the Pacific Northwest where the culture has not supported church involvement and religious studies to the extent of other regions of the US. This often translates to small class sizes and a small but energetic student body. The faculty-to-student ratio often ranges from 1:2 to 1:5. The small class sizes, however, afford a high level of personalization and feedback.

Graduation Rates and Statistics:

As of June 2026, 73% (47) of our 64 graduates (since our inception in 1983) are actively engaged in current ministry as pastors, missionaries, or church workers.

Over the past 13 years (2013-2026), WRS has had 45 degree students, of whom 25 have graduated, with 1 more expected to graduate in 2026. 35% of those students completed their program of study within 3 years. Over the same period, 55% of our students have completed their program of study within 4 years. This does not include non-degree students taking individual classes for personal enrichment.

In the last six years, out of 18 degree students who were enrolled from 2018 to 2025: 14 graduated (78%); Four are currently completing their programs (27%); totaling 89% have completed or are on track to complete their degree program. Out of those 18 degree students who were enrolled from 2018 to 2025: Two dropped out of WRS (11%); Three are inactive and may return to studies (17%), totaling 28% who dropped or temporarily discontinued their degree programs.

As of June 2026, 53% of our 64 graduates entered the pastoral ministry, and 14% are involved in other full-time Christian ministries. Most of the remaining graduates are engaged in volunteer church work.

As of June 2026, 18% of our 64 graduates pursued additional advanced degrees at other institutions.

How WRS Students Use Their Seminary Education

WRS is an approved independent agency of the Bible Presbyterian Church, but it is not a licensing or ordination body for any denomination. In the past five years, WRS graduated seven degree students. One was already an ordained pastor in his denomination. One was already serving as an ordained elder and working in a full-time ministry position. The other five were bi-vocational degree students serving in volunteer capacities within their local churches. Upon graduation, one of the bi-vocational degree students went into full-time Christian ministry.

In the fall semester of 2025, WRS had 32 registered students: 8 degree students, 1 credit student, and 23 auditors. Five of the students were already serving in full-time ministry positions. Twenty-seven are taking classes for personal growth and volunteer service in the local church. Five are bi-vocational degree students, and two others are foreign students, all of whom may pursue ministry employment after graduation.

Student Evaluations:

WRS continuously assesses how our students are meeting learning outcomes and how programs can be shaped to foster improved learning. The primary purpose of assessment is for use by faculty and administration to continuously reflect on and refine their courses, programs, and supports for student learning. Students are regularly asked to provide feedback and input regarding WRS's educational curriculum, processes, and instruction. Following the completion of each course that is taught, current students evaluate the faculty member, content, delivery, and other important elements of a seminary course. These evaluations are collated, analyzed, and used by the Administration and Faculty of the seminary to adjust, change, or maintain the course and its curriculum, as appropriate.
