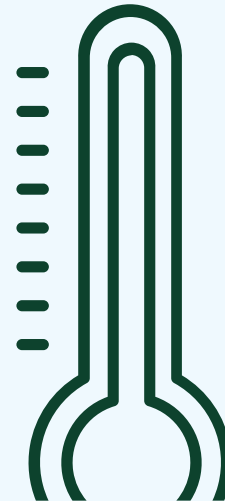
Purpose + Sustainability = Change

Campaign in Action

Who needs fast fashion when you can have free fashion? Stella Korins started the Trinity Thrift at her school where students can “shop” clothes that have been donated by other students. Donated clothes are washed, sorted, and even revamped in the Trinity Thrift. Best of all, this school thrift system helps the environment by encouraging students to get their new clothing from the thrift and avoid supporting fast fashion.

Ways to Take Action

From local littering to global warming, there are so many ways to positively impact our environment!



Types of Service

Choose the type that works best for you!

DIRECT

Direct service involves getting hands on with the project in person with those you are serving. For example:

- Build a pollinator garden on your school campus.

INDIRECT

Indirect service involves helping from a distance through material collection or donations. For example:

- Hold a fundraiser to donate to organizations that are helping alleviate global warming.

ADVOCACY

Advocacy involves taking what you've learned about an issue and spreading that knowledge to others. For example:

- Organizing a social media campaign or podcast teaching others about environmental issues.

Suggestions by Grade Level

GRADES 4–6

- Organize a garbage pickup walk at the school or nearby park. Get family and friends to pledge a dollar amount for every pound of garbage collected.
- Take an online sustainability pledge with your classmates. Spread the word to different classes around you to get the whole school on board!
- There are so many cute options out there for reusable products—invest in a water bottle or food containers to keep your lunch litter-free!

GRADES 7–8

- Make your own beeswax wrap using a few simple sustainable ingredients! Start up a lunchtime craft show, where you sell your wraps and donate the proceeds to a green cause of your choosing.
- Engage your class in a zero-waste week! Put one garbage bag in the center of the room and see how much you can avoid filling it by the end of the week, using waste-free strategies in your classroom.

GRADES 9–12

- Put your scientific investigation skills to work to learn more about energy conservation and what you can do to improve your energy usage on a daily basis. Share your findings with your classmates and challenge your friends to do the same!
- Start a school eco-club and run different green initiatives throughout the year. For example, in the winter, host a "sweater weather" day to allow the heat to be reduced in your school.

Step 1: Investigate and Learn

Start here to learn about issues relating to the environment on a local, or even global level.

Learning Goals:

- Demonstrate the ability to conduct research to investigate and analyze social issues.
- Gain a comprehensive understanding of the social issue, including historical background, current manifestations, and key populations involved.
- Understand existing solutions put in place for the social issue and the effectiveness and/or limitations of these solutions.
- Consider what can be done to further improve solutions to the social issue using critical thinking and collaborative learning.

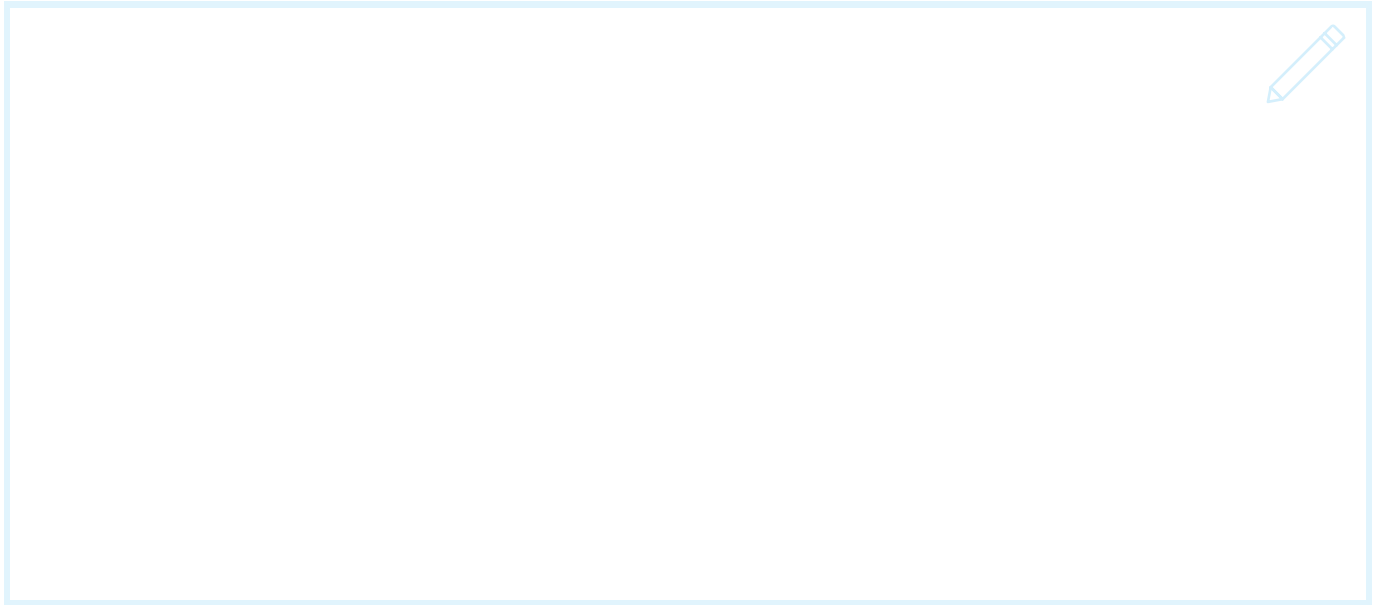

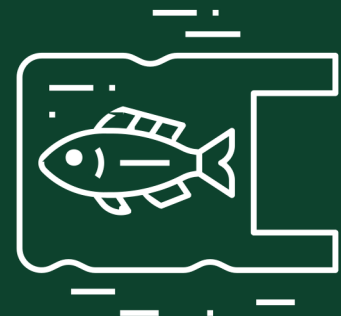
