

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

We successfully welcomed the world and showed what this region can achieve at its best. Recognition of Seattle as one of the tournament's premier Host Cities renewed civic pride in the place we call home while reinforcing our position as a world-class sports and global visitor destination. FIFA World Cup 26™ became one of the largest collaborative efforts in state history, bringing together governments more than 400 organizations in planning and delivery.

As the SeattleFWC26 Local Organizing Committee concludes its work, this report highlights the tournament's impact, lessons for future major events, and the positive legacy created for communities across the region.



The final whistle was just the beginning. FIFA World Cup 26 served as a catalyst for lasting benefits across Washington. New and upgraded playfields, accessibility initiatives, arts and culture investments, and community partnerships will continue benefiting people and communities throughout the state for decades.

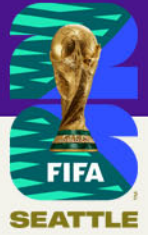

LESSONS LEARNED

WHAT WORKED WELL

- **Seattle showed up:** Fans and visitors experienced a vibrant, welcoming, and united Seattle. The tournament reminded us that major events can do more than attract visitors and generate revenue - they can bring communities together and restore pride in place.
- **Partnerships make the difference:** Seattle's success grew from public-private collaboration. Partners advanced long-term infrastructure and contributed the funding, expertise, and organizational support needed to host the world's largest sporting event.
- **Coordination made a complex event work:** Close collaboration among the Local Organizing Committee, businesses, public agencies, venue teams, transportation partners, and other operators helped Seattle manage a complex event footprint and respond effectively throughout the tournament.
- **Bring the event to the people:** Official and community-led celebrations expanded participation, supported neighborhood businesses, and created authentic gathering spaces. Their success demonstrates the value of distributing future major-event programming and highlights potential for reimagining places like Pacific Place as civic gathering spaces.
- **Great transit and inviting public spaces make welcoming events:** Pedestrian-focused areas at Pike Place Market, the waterfront, and Pioneer Square welcomed residents, visitors, and vendors, while expanded transit service supported record ridership and showcased a welcoming, accessible region.
- **Making the event work for the community:** Whether it was the Puyallup Tribe of Indians' Pow Wow and World Cup celebrations, parking lot improvements in the C/ID, RAVE Foundation's new soccer fields, or showcasing local traditions for Pride & Juneteenth, Seattle used a fleeting moment of international focus to advance local community priorities rather than compete with them. The result was that the World's biggest sporting event helped our region shine instead of outshining it.

WHAT TO WORK ON

- **Earlier decisions lead to better planning:** One challenge throughout the planning process was the delayed timing for receiving critical external information needed to support local decision-making.
- **Streamline permitting for mega-events:** Major events involve multiple activations, locations, and public agencies operating simultaneously. Future events would benefit from the designation and empowerment of a City major event lead earlier, providing a more coordinated framework across permitting agencies.
- **Help more communities benefit:** Future organizers should provide frequent and ongoing updates to planning assumptions so that public agencies and neighborhood organizations can coordinate with local businesses to host compelling neighborhood activations that draw visitors beyond the primary event footprint.
- **Distance from the event should shape small business strategies:** Small businesses nearest the event, close to transit, or along pedestrian approaches can benefit from increased fan traffic. Other small businesses may benefit more from strategies to keep regular customers visiting during the event. Planning at the neighborhood level is too general—just one block makes a big difference in fan traffic.
- **Mega events require early public-private partnerships:** Events can create economic benefits and civic pride, but successful delivery depends on early public-private funding commitments and realistic assumptions about available commercial rights.
- **Preserve knowledge and readiness:** A standing Local Organizing Committee — or a similar ongoing coordinating structure — could retain institutional knowledge, maintain critical relationships, support a pipeline of major-event opportunities, and strengthen Seattle's readiness to host future events.
